TASK FORCE FOCUSES ON ENERGY USE AT AIA HEAD-QUARTERS

Energy use in AlA's Washington headquarters will come under close scrutiny in the next few months as a new task force seeks ways to improve the building's energy efficiency.


Goal of the project is to reduce energy consumption by 60 per cent. The task force will begin its work immediately and report its recommendations for action at the end of 1976.

Chairman of the task force is Herbert E. Duncan Jr., FAIA. Serving with him are Robert A. Burley and David L. Perkins, FAIA, both members of the Board of Directors Energy Committee.

The task force was appointed by President Louis de Moll, FAIA, following a two-day workshop demonstrating techniques used in educating architects in the principles of energy conscious design.

Workshop participants included national AIA officers, (among them First Vice President John M. McGinty, FAIA, shown at right during the workshop), members of the energy committee, and key staff personnel. The building's original architect and mechanical engineer also participated.

The workshop was one of a series conducted throughout the country by the AIA Research Corporation as part of a project on energy conscious design supported by the Federal Energy Administration.



REPUBLICANS HEAR AIA ENERGY PLAN

AIA President Louis de Moll, FAIA, has urged the Republican Party to make energy conservation in buildings a key element of the energy plank in the party's 1976 platform.

Speaking at platform hearings just before the opening of the GOP national convention in Kansas City, de Moll cited AIA studies of energy use in the built environment and voiced four major recommendations for the Republican platform:

—adoption of a high priority national effort to create an energy efficient built environment; —federal development of energy conservation performance standards for new residential and commercial construction;

—creation of financial incentives to encourage energy conscious design and retrofitting of new and existing buildings, and —increased emphasis on research and development of alternative energy resources.

A similar presentation to the Democratic Platform Committee by AIA Vice President Carl L. Bradley, FAIA, earlier this summer resulted in the adoption of major portions of AIA's proposal into the 1976 Democratic platform (see MEMO #518).

The final language in the energy plank of the Republican platform, adopted at the Kansas City convention, includes a line calling for "both expansion of energy supply and improvement of energy efficiency . . . at all levels of our society," and urging "expanded research and development in the use of solar, geothermal . . . and other sources of energy."
